Veterans and Others with Disabilities Welcomed at Ford Motor Company

Henry Ford laid the foundation for disabled veterans to be welcomed as employees of Ford Motor Company. Early in the company's history, he saw to it that people with disabilities were given the chance to prove themselves, and many of them became loyal and productive employees.

Finding a Place for Returning Veterans

Ford's philosophy of inclusion was shared by his grandson, Henry Ford II. Near the end of World War II, and especially in its aftermath, numerous wounded and disabled veterans were flooding back into the workforce. Henry Ford II understood that persons with disabilities, including returning veterans, wanted and deserved an equal chance to work.

As had been done in the early days, Henry Ford II made efforts to integrate returning veterans into the workplace. This meant accommodating blind persons and providing specially modified equipment for those who had lost limbs, for example.

A Legacy of Inclusion

Even before World War II, Ford Motor Company was known as one that was more interested in a prospective employee's abilities than any disabilities the person might have. In 1937, an article in Ford News reported that the company had "11,632 men in various stages of disability earning full pay," and the article made a point of saying that "they give full value for their wages."

The company's leadership in the employment of persons with disabilities continued through the years. In the 1970s, Henry Ford II was a founding member of the National Business and Disability Council, long before the U.S. government enacted laws requiring equal opportunity for persons with disabilities.

- → Production totals 160,211; Fewest Deluxe Station Wagon, 567; Most Super De Luxe Tudor Sedan, 37,199

Homemade Mac & Cheese

INGREDIENTS

- Equal parts chicken broth & water (to boil macaroni)
- 3 cups macaroni
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1/2 cup half-and-half
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup cream cheese, softened
- 4 cups finely shredded cheeses (sharp cheddar*, mozzarella, gouda, muenster)
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- A few dashes paprika

- 1 Preheat oven to 350°F. Meanwhile, combine equal parts water and chicken broth (just enough to cook your macaroni in) in a large pot and bring to a boil on the stovetop.
- 2 Add macaroni and cook until al dente according to instructions on box (usually about 7-8 minutes). When macaroni is done, drain and set aside.
- 3 In a large saucepan over medium heat, melt butter and whisk in the flour. Cook for about a minute, whisking constantly. Keep whisking as you add in 1 cup chicken broth, half-and-half, and milk; continue whisking until fully combined. You want the mixture to steam but NOT boil. Adjust your heat accordingly. Add in the cream cheese and stir until completely dissolved and smooth.
- 4 Remove pot from heat and add in 4 cups of cheese, stirring until smooth. Pour cheese mixture over cooked macaroni and stir to combine. Add some black pepper if you'd like.
- 5 Grease a 9x9-inch baking pan with butter and pour mac and cheese into it. Bake in preheated oven for 25-30 minutes until slightly jiggly, making sure not to overcook. The macaroni will set and firm up as it cools.






