Meeting Adjourn: 6:51 pm



The Ford Six for 1950

CELEBRATING 7 1 2 2 2

Yes, a 1950 Ford would be considered 75 years old as of today, February 2025, making it a classic car with historical significance, particularly in the context of Ford's long history of producing police vehicles which often started with the "Custom" model from that era.

Key points about 1950 Fords:



O Milestone for Police Vehicles:
Ford started offering a "Police Package" on their
Custom model around 1950, marking a significant
point in the development of dedicated law
enforcement vehicles. This makes them a sought
after collector vehicle.

O Classic Design:

The 1950 Ford was an evolution of the 1949 model, and was part of a "Golden Era" for Ford Motor Company. The 1950 Ford was available in seven models and two engine options.

Features

- The 1950 Ford was known as the "Shoe Box" Ford because of its pontoon design.
- The 1950 Ford had a split windshield and a chunky chrome strip in the center.
- ◆ The 1950 Ford had a V-8 L-head engine that was 239 cu. in./3.9 l.
- The 1950 Ford was popular with enthusiasts and customizers because of its styling and the availability of performance parts.
 The 1950 Ford was the original Ford "F" series truck, and all trucks after this model have the designation of "F" such as the F-150 and F-250.


