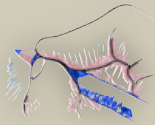

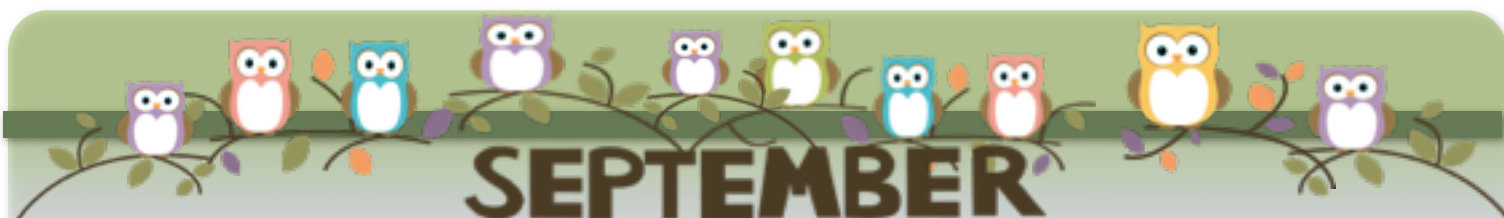
The next board meeting will be Thursday, September 21 at Mirabeau. No host dinner at 6 pm, meeting at 7:00 pm.

DOWNTOWN SCHOLARSHIP BENEFIT CAR SHOW

Several years ago, an auction and dinner was established yearly to raise money for scholarships throughout the car community. We did this for ten years, and ceased when we couldn't get any new helpers, as we were all exhausted. But no matter! The money raised was invested and only the investment proceeds were given away each year, so the fund would go on in perpetuity. Also, with the addition of donations from the various car clubs each year, we give away even more money to the scholarship recipients.

On Thursday evening, July 20, 525 beautiful cars showed up to line the blocked off streets in downtown Spokane. Several cars received awards, including V8 members Butch and BJ Glander.

A total of 15 scholarships were awarded at \$1,500 each, for a total value of \$22,500. All students were thankful for the monies awarded and shared with us the colleges they would be attending. To date, \$253,000 has been given away by the Inland Northwest Car Club Scholarship Committee. Later in the evening, door prizes were given away. It was a beautiful evening downtown with music and plenty of places to eat. If you missed it, be sure and put it on your calendar for next year.

Painted by Pittsburgh artist J. Howard Miller

In 1942, Pittsburgh artist J. Howard Miller was hired by the Westinghouse Company's War Production Coordinating Committee to create a series of posters for the war effort. One of these posters became the famous "We Can Do It!" image—an image that in later years would also be called "Rosie the Riveter", though it was never given this title during the war. Miller is thought to have based his "We Can Do It!" poster on a United Press International wire service photograph taken of a young female war worker, widely but erroneously reported as being a photo of Michigan war worker Geraldine Hoff (later Doyle.) More recent evidence indicates that the formerly mis-identified photo is actually of war worker Naomi Parker (later Fraley) taken at Alameda Naval Air Station in California. The "We Can Do It!" poster was displayed only to Westinghouse employees in the Midwest during a two-week period in February 1943, then it disappeared for nearly four decades. During the war, the name "Rosie" was not associated with the image, and the purpose of the poster was not to recruit women workers but rather as motivational propaganda aimed at workers of both sexes already employed at Westinghouse. It was only later, in the early 1980s, that the Miller poster was rediscovered and became famous, associated with feminism, and often mistakenly called "Rosie the Riveter".

World War II would permanently change the role of women in the workforce. As American men went off to war, women began to take jobs that were previously only held by men.

During WWII, six million new women workers entered the labor force, taking jobs in heavy industry and other previously male-dominated industries.

Famous images like Rosie the Riveter symbolized this period and heralded a new future for women in the workforce.

Women in the Workforce After World War II

After the war, large numbers of women were forced to relinquish their jobs to returning veterans. Women, however, continued to enter the workforce in record numbers. Some of the most popular positions held by women during the post-war period included:

- Office work
- Retail sales
- Nursing
- Teaching
- "and other so-called feminine occupations"

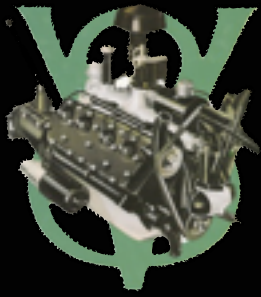

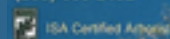

Train Ride Returns to Newport With a Few Changes

Many people were saddened when the Pend Oreille County excursion train, that has been an autumn ritual for train enthusiasts and families for over 35 years, closed last year. Well good news; it has been given new life.

Railroad officials told the North Pend Oreille Lions Club they couldn't afford to maintain the track from Lone to Metaline Falls in northern Pend Oreille County any longer just for the popular ride. Without industrial customers north of Usk to pay the costs of the track, the railroad no longer needs to maintain it.

After studying the project, the Newport/Priest River Rotary Club is ready to help – at least for one year. The Rotary recently announced a schedule for new excursion train rides, with a route from Newport to Dalkena and back. They started August 12th and will end October 15th. The 24-mile round trip will take an hour and a half. Some members of the Lions Club, who operated the train ride from Lone to Metaline Falls, will be helping the Rotary.

The ride starts and ends in downtown Newport, behind the Pend Oreille Public Utility buildings. Snacks, drinks and restrooms are available in each car. Volunteers will dress in historic train-crew costumes. Riders will be able to experience what it was like 100 years ago rolling through a remote forest when the railroad carried logs to the mills and people from Metaline Falls to Spokane twice a day. The train will have a locomotive on each end so operators don't have to switch engines, just the crew.

The Rotary will sell advance tickets on their website at <https://sporttrainrides.com>. They call the excursion the "Scenic Pend Oreille River Train." Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$15 for children. The train will seat 350 per ride. A \$3 discount is offered for groups of 20 or more. The weekend of October 14th and 15th will be Halloween themed.

The Rotary will use the ticket revenue to pay for expenses, with the rest going to community service projects. They will pay the Lions half the revenue for use of their cars. The Lions pay the Inland Empire Railroad Historical Society for use of their two coaches and one open car.
